

# Public Policy & Nongovernmental Organizations (NGOs) Career Guide

## **About Public Policy & NGOs**

Public policy is a set of laws, regulations, courses of action, and funding priorities concerning a given topic promoted by a governmental entity to address societal problems. Public policy is created through a complex process that involves and is influenced by government officials, interest groups, business leaders, academic experts, and the public. Economics is a valuable tool for policy professionals because it can help them understand how different policies affect businesses, consumers, the environment and the global economy. Policy professionals work to test and shape the laws and regulations that govern our society, and they can have a profound impact on people's lives. There are many different career paths in policy, from working in government or regulated industries to working for think tanks and advocacy groups.

Non-governmental organizations (NGOs) are usually non-profit organizations that are dedicated to a particular cause, such as poverty reduction, environmental protection, or human rights. NGOs can be local, national, or international. NGOs provide services that governments may not be able to provide, such as education, healthcare, and disaster relief. They also advocate for policy change and raise awareness of important issues. Economics can be beneficial to NGOs to understand the economic implications of their work, raise funds, advocate for policy change, and manage their resources effectively.
