

Banking and Finance Career Guide

About Banking and Finance

Finance is a specialized branch of economics concerned with the origination and management of money, credit, banking and investment. Typical areas of finance are corporate finance, investments, financial institutions, and risk management.

- **Corporate finance** is the study of how firms raise funds from investors, how they invest those funds in return generating projects, and how they distribute those returns back to investors.
- **Investments** is the study of securities (stocks, bonds, etc.) and the markets in which they trade.
- **Financial institutions** is the study of banks and other institutions which bring together the suppliers and users of funds.
- **Risk management** is the study of how individuals and firms can limit their exposures to the volatility of existing financial positions.

Economics fosters an analytical mindset and quantitative skills, which are beneficial in a broad variety of roles in both the banking and finance fields:

Recruitment Timelines: For internships or new grad jobs starting in the summer, larger financial or banking firms (i.e.; Wall Street) tend to host information sessions (typically virtual) and promote these offerings in Handshake during April/May or August/September. Application periods are as early as 12-18 months BEFORE roles begin (i.e.; sophomores could be applying in the spring semester/early summer for summer internships occurring AFTER their junior year). For non-Wall Street roles, applications seasons typically follow standard recruitment cycles of the first 6-8 weeks of fall and spring semesters (late August to late October and late January to late March).


